Ideas to get you started...

Non-Uniform Day

Anyone can 'Be All It Takes' so we want your pupils to be themselves for the day because you don't have to wear a uniform to help save a life! Non-uniform days are something you know well, and pupils love. It's a simple and easy fundraiser which the whole school can get involved in.



Cake Sale

Hold a cake sale to raise money and give it a theme, such as heart-shaped bakes or the colour green. This could be a great project for a group of students. This tasty little fundraiser can be rolled out at any time and as many times as you want. After all, there is no such thing as too much cake!

Staffroom Sweepstake

Use our staffroom sweepstake poster to take guesses on how Cardio Carl likes to keep his heart healthy... with 25 sports and at £2 a guess, this super easy activity could make £25 for charity and a £25 prize for the winner!

Put on a show

Fashion, talent, game or other, use the skills of your pupils and staff team to put on a show. Sell tickets in advance and refreshments on the night to raise funds, use the school as a venue to keep costs down and invite parents, friends and family along.

Chosen Charity

No time to plan something new? We'd love to be your chosen charity for whatever you've got going on at school. Could you donate a percentage of a ticket price from a school performance? Or include information about the importance of first aid and the work of St John Ambulance Cymru and our volunteers in your school newsletter?

Art Auction

Look to your art department for this one... could you give your art students (and staff) the opportunity to showcase their work and raise money for a good cause at the same time? Run a live auction, pop some pieces on eBay or hold an exhibition where the artwork is available to buy. You could split the money raised between the school and St John Ambulance Cymru.

Want to keep it simple?

Try these quick and easy ideas...

- Set up a charity book exchange in your library or staffroom
- Bypass the vending machines and set up a charity tuck shop
- Put a collection tin in a public area for visitors to see or in the canteen for loose change
- ..make sure you ask your staff team and students if there's anything they'd like to do and how they'd like to get involved!

Teachers Forfeit

Is there a teacher (or two) at your school who will take one for the team? Choose your forfeit; it could be allowing pupils to throw wet sponges at you, sitting in a bath of beans, fancy dress, shaving heads or waxing legs... there's a challenge for everyone. Staff and pupils would enjoy seeing a teacher squirm their way through a forfeit for charity. Pick something that works for your school and decide on if the forfeit becomes sponsored or people donate to take part (e.g £1 to throw a sponge or pour in another can of beans).



Be All It Takes, just like 11-year-old Milly...

Milly was out enjoying a sunny day with her family, in North Wales when something unexpected happened.

Milly's uncle collapsed and was having difficulty breathing. Luckily Milly had received first aid training from St John Ambulance Cymru at her school and knew just what to do.

Milly had learnt how to react when someone becomes unresponsive. She assessed the situation, and realised her uncle was not only unresponsive but was having problems breathing; his tongue was blocking his airway. Milly used her knowledge to open her uncle's airway and put him in the recovery position.

Milly asked her mum, Katy to stay with her uncle while she ran to a nearby house to get help and phone an ambulance. Her actions meant her uncle was able to breathe properly and was safe whilst they waited for the emergency services to arrive.



Katy told us: "I panicked and didn't know what to do. I'm so thankful Milly was there; I am incredibly proud of her actions. I'm extremely grateful Milly's school identify the importance of first aid and to St John Ambulance Cymru for providing my daughter with lifesaving skills and the confidence to use them when it mattered. I hope this experience encourages other schools to follow in the footsteps of hers".

It just goes to show that anyone can 'Be All It Takes' in an emergency and you don't have to wear a uniform to save a life.

Teach your pupils lifesaving skills

St John Ambulance Cymru provide training in schools across Wales, giving children the confidence and knowledge they need to save a life. There are two ways your pupils can learn with us, for free:

- 1. Our trainers can visit your school to provide First Aid Awareness or Public Access Defib Awareness sessions. We will visit you to provide a 2 hour session for a class of 30 students or we can run a demonstration for a larger group during a school assembly.
- 2. Join our Young Lifesavers Award Scheme and receive teaching resources and information about first aid and it's place in the curriculum so you can deliver sessions to your pupils yourself. You can register and download materials from: www.sjacymru.org.uk/yls

How your money could help

When you fundraise for St John Ambulance Cymru you could help us save lives and teach others to do the same. Here are just some examples of the difference your donations could make:

£5

could reward a Cadet who has volunteered 50 hours of their time

ESO

could give a Cadet the skills they need to become a peer trainer, meaning they can teach first aid to other children and young people

£180

could enable St John Ambulance Cymru to give a class of school children free first aid training

£250

could help us recruit and train a new volunteer Youth Leader for one of our groups

£1,000

could provide a local St John Ambulance Cymru division with a lifesaving defibrillator to use in an emergency

Are your staff first aid trained?

We have a number of courses that can help your school to be prepared for when an accident or emergency happens, including:

Schools First Aid (5-hour course)

Teachers are often the first on the scene of an accident at school. This course teaches essential first aid skills to anyone who works with children.

First Aid at Work (3-day course)

Make sure you have fully qualified first aiders at school with this HSE recognised course. It provides the practical skills required, and helps build confidence to deal with real life emergencies.

eBay

When selling on eBay you can donate straight to St John Ambulance Cymru. When you're listing an item, choose St John Ambulance Cymru as the charity you want to support and the percentage you want to give. Plus, when you sell an 'eBay for Charity' item, you're eligible for a fee credit. eBay's basic selling fees will be credited back to you according to the level of your donation. For example, if you donate 50% of your item's sale price, you'll receive a credit of 50% of your basic selling fees.
