The next generation of lifesavers

We want every child and young person in Wales to have basic first aid skills. Which is why, we're proud to provide opportunities and youth programmes for children and young people from the age of five; creating environments where they can grow and learn from an early age.

We run two youth programmes that give young people the chance to learn vital skills that they will take with them for the rest of their lives:

Badgers

Our Badger programme for 5-10 year-olds provides a fun, friendly, and safe environment to learn about communication, healthy living, first aid, and much more.

Cadets

Giving young people aged 11-18 access to a wide range of personal development and volunteering opportunities. They can also take part in accredited learning to prepare them for the next step in their lives.

Cadets can volunteer alongside adults at events, keeping the public safe, or they can be peer trainers, teaching first aid skills to their communities. We provide a clear pathway for these young people into adult volunteering and to become our next generation of lifesavers.

Both our programmes help teach the skills you need to save a life, give incredible learning experiences and help children learn and grow in all aspects of life.

Thanks to our specialist skills at St John Ambulance Cymru, they're are also the perfect springboard for our healthcare professionals of the future, and can be a great starting point for young people who want to work in health and social care, such as becoming a paramedic or nurse. Our programmes offer experiential learning opportunities, develop young people's aspirations and enhance their personal and professional development alongside teaching vital first aid.

Gifts in wills mean we can plan ahead with the confidence that we'll be there to support young people in Wales with their next steps for years to come, so that they can support their communities for generations.

Who you support

Jemma joined her local Badger Sett to learn first aid from a young age. This was really important to Jemma and her family, as her mum, Hayley has epilepsy and could need help at any moment.

Jemma learnt vital first aid skills with us which means she can help care for her mum when she has a seizure and in the time after

Hayley shared with us how Jemma can tell almost every time before her seizure starts, and identify that she's not feeling herself. Thanks to her learning at Badgers, Jemma knows exactly what to do when this happens. She has learnt to lower her mum to the floor, protect her head and move anything that could be a danger.

Her first aid training has taught her to monitor breathing and the importance of timing any seizure, knowing when there is a need to call 999.

Once the convulsions have stopped Jemma will move Hayley into the recovery position and keep talking to her so she can hear her voice when coming around.

Hayley describes her daughter Jemma, as "an amazing young person", which is exactly what we think about all of our Badgers and Cadets. Each and every one of them shows dedication and compassion to helping others and their communities

How to make a will

If you are making your first will


If you are making your first will, then you should talk to a solicitor or professional will writing service. This will ensure your will is legally correct and that all your wishes are carried out.



A solicitor will be able to help you:

- Value your estate
- Choose your executors those responsible for carrying out your wishes
- Include what you would like to leave to your relatives and friends
- Include details of any charities you would like to remember in your will and the gifts you would like to leave for them

If you have already made a will





- Contact your solicitor
- Instruct your solicitor that you would like to leave a legacy gift
- Give your solicitor the details of the legacy gift and some information about our charity
- Your solicitor can add this instruction to your existing will – this is known as a Codicil

To help you decide how you might leave a bequest to St John Ambulance Cymru, the main types of legacy gifts are listed on the next page.

Types of Legacy

Specific amount

This is when you leave a specific amount of money to a person, organisation, or charity known as a **pecuniary bequest**. Please remember that inflation may impact the amount the beneficiary receives. You have the option of asking your executors to increase the sum in line with inflation so that its real value is protected.

A proportion of your estate

You may choose to leave whatever is left over once all your other specific bequests are made, debts are paid, and costs are met. This is the residue of your estate, known as a **residuary bequest** and it means that your family and friends receive exactly what you want, with St John Ambulance Cymru receiving all or a percentage of what is left.

Specific item

A specific bequest is when you choose to leave a specific item such as a painting, piece of jewellery or a portfolio of shares as a gift in your will.



Making a bequest

If you decide to help us with our lifesaving work and leave St John Ambulance Cymru a gift in your will, the following is some useful information about our charity for you to use:
